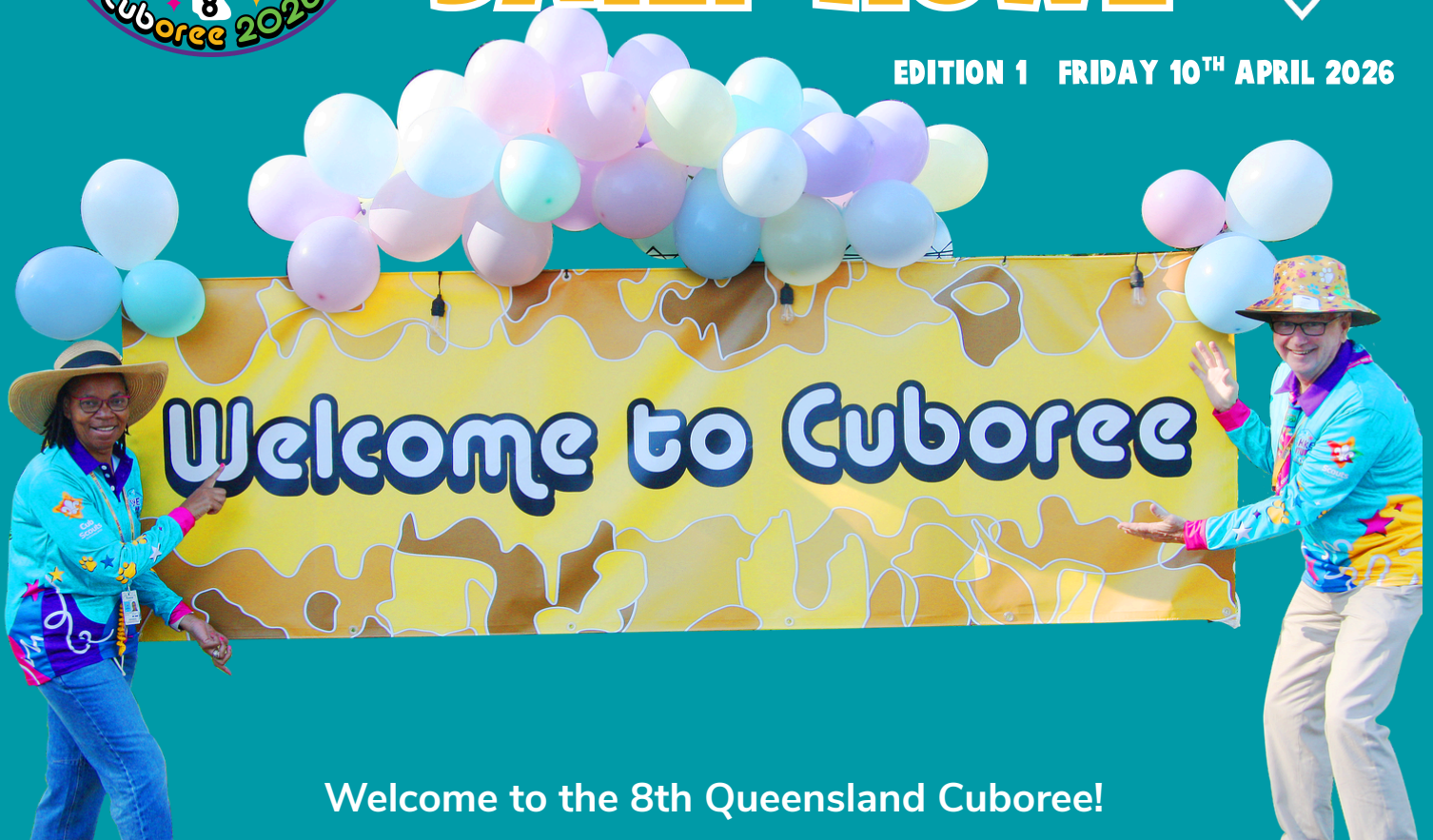

## CUSTODIANS

Cuboree is proud to acknowledge the custodians of the land on which we meet at BP Park in Samford. The Waka Waka people's land stretches north towards Mount Perry and runs south through Murgon, Kingaroy, Nanango ends down southeast towards the outer parts of Brisbane.

The Waka Waka land also encompasses the sacred ground of the Bunya Mountains. This site was sacred to them and different Tribes from Queensland and Northern New South Wales would journey up to the mountains every year. Commonly referred to as The Bunya Feast, tribes would gather together and eat the seeds that fell from the trees.

Western Linguists who studied languages, were able to determine the word Waka meant no. It was a common term similarly used in the Gubbi Gubbi tribe.
